CAMPUS NEWS

The Noah's Ark nursery kitchen is being refurbished. It has been repainted, with new flooring, cupboards, a double sink and appliances fitted. Once all the work is complete, it will be registered with the local authority so that snacks can be prepared for the children, and will mean the nursery team can do some baking with them! The college kitchen has been providing the snacks for the last two years, which has been a huge blessing.

Preparations are well underway for our first in-person REACH conference in four years! We are excited to see our campus filled with over 200 young people, coming to hear more about missions. We pray that the Lord will raise up labourers for His harvest field.

















A recent upgrade in the college building has been to put vinyl flooring in the corridor by the classrooms. This turned into a real team effort. Once the old carpet was removed, the subfloor was found to be inferior, and approximately seven tons of sharp sand were used to mix a screed, which replaced the 60mm that had to be removed over the area of 90m². The result was well worth the effort.

In the dormitory accommodation allocated to families, door closures connected to the fire alarm system are in the process of being installed for safety and ease of access for the children.

Missionaries who are part of the church planting team rely on their fellow support missionaries to aid them in focusing solely on reaching and ministering to lost people groups.

At North Cotes College, we rely on individuals volunteering for a year, sometimes longer, to fulfil roles that enable the students to focus on their studies.

Daily tasks for this role may be assigned according to the parents' preference.





The **nursery** provides onsite childcare for the preschool children of our students and personnel during morning class time.

n 2017 I attended REACH, my first New Tribes Mission conference. I had been seeking the Lord's guidance in my life and was surprised by the number of people on the mission field serving in vital support roles. I did not realise that I could be a part of the team of people reaching the unreached with the Gospel by doing what I had already been trained to do (i.e. teaching music).

Initially, I was not at all keen on the idea of serving overseas. I am not naturally the adventurous type and the specific need that was highlighted to me was in Papua New Guinea! This was a very long way away for someone who really did not like travelling and was struggling with some health issues. I was not convinced that this was the role for me, but it was!

The Lord gently guided and by July 2018, I was in PNG, teaching music at Numonohi Christian Academy as an associate member of NTM. The purpose of the school (of approximately 150 students from ten different nationalities), is to glorify God and to assist with the establishment of indigenous tribal churches throughout PNG, by supporting missionary parents in providing a Christ-centred education for their children. I initially intended to help for a year or two with the music programme and then return to the UK to get back to "normal" life, but I continued for four years.

I really enjoyed all the different musical opportunities, from classroom teaching to starting a choir with PNG men and women to celebrate their Independence Day. I also taught the students Tok Pisin, the most widely spoken language in PNG. I thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the locals and being able to study the Bible with some of them.

Visiting a couple of church plants in tribal locations impacted me deeply and I was able to meet, and hopefully also encourage, several church planting missionaries as they passed through our support centre. It was such a privilege to work as a valued part of the wider mission team. I am now studying at North Cotes College, becoming better equipped to serve the Lord in the coming years.

Perhaps you are considering stepping out of your comfort zone? It might not always be plain sailing but remember, God is faithful and "He is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Ephesians 3:20).





THE ROAD-CUTTING MAN

Since 2017, Ethnos360 Aviation has been serving the team reaching the Maliyali people group in Papua New Guinea. Pilot Josh Verdonck remembers helping them move in and flying them to the closest airstrip in the Kodiak airplane. From there, the helicopter shuttled them into the



village. Now, five years later, Josh himself is flying the R66 helicopter to deliver supplies to the team. Every one of those flights has helped to bring the Maliyali to this decisive moment

In August 2022, the Maliyali missionary team taught a series of lessons, starting from the very beginning of the Bible, introducing the series with a geography lesson to show the Maliyali the immensity of the planet. Then from Psalm 8:1-4, they introduced God, bigger than all creation, who cares for them, even though they are just a small group in the vast world.

Day after day, the Maliyali people heard the unfolding of God's Word: who God is, what He created and how some of the angels turned from God and became evil spirits, how Adam and Eve fell into sin and that "those born under the line of Adam would be born with sin and into the clan of Satan..."

Oh, the joy, though, to hear from Genesis 3:15 that God promised to send the "Road-cutting Man" to make a way for people to get back to God, taking away sin. Who would it be? They faithfully continued attending the lessons, waiting to hear the answer.

They saw the horrible effects of sin, as when Cain slew Abel, and the devastation of sin and the destruction of the world by the Flood. They saw the Ark as God's sovereign protection of the line that the Redeemer would come through. They wondered, "What kind of road will God make for us to be rescued from our sin and from going to the created place of fire?" When they heard that Abraham believed God, they wondered, "Will the Road-cutting Man bring us talk to believe?"

With story after story, they could see God's goodness, His provision, His unchangeable character. When they heard the law, they realised they could not keep it any more than the Israelites who strayed from God. However, they had hope in the Roadcutting Man.

Finally, a baby was born in an unusual way. They pondered: "His name is Jesus. He is the only one through whom God will cut the road in getting people back to Him. Is there any other road? No way."

Through the story of Nicodemus, they were blown away by a new concept: "God loves me. I have never heard this; this is the first time. Through His love for all peoples, He has made one road, Jesus. When they heard what Jesus did for them — how He "cut the road" through His death, burial and resurrection — many Maliyali looked to the Road-cutting Man and put their trust in Him. May God be praised in Heaven and on earth!

FROM EVERY TRIBE AND LANGUAGE AND PEOPLE AND NATION



n 1969 George and I, along with Wendy, our three month old daughter, set out on a journey to Southeast Asia. Revelation 5:9 urged us on, "because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased for God men from every tribe and language and people and nation."

On arriving in Southeast Asia, we wondered which people group we would live among. At that time a work among the Pwo Karen had opened up, so after a year of national language study in Bangkok, we enthusiastically journeyed to Kanchanaburi province, famed for its "Bridge Over The River Kwai".

We lived in a Pwo Karen village in an area called Nasuan for about thirty years. During that time, a small group of villagers came to faith in Christ. One of those was a man named Chi, a Pwo Karen refugee who had fled from his home country. Down through the years the Lord has worked in Chi's heart in many wonderful ways. Now he is the main helper in the translation of the Pwo Karen Bible.

As the years went by, George and I came to realise that this people group is quite large, and are located across several countries. This led us to visit other Pwo Karen villages. Our vision was to seek those who desired to listen to the message we had to share with them.



These journeys eventually led us to move to the village of Sarawat. In the year 2000, a group of around 100 Pwo Karen gathered from several villages to Sarawat to hear the message that George had to bring. George taught this group three times a day. A group of around ten would come to the house in the evening to hear more. The teaching continued for a couple of weeks until many needed to return to their own villages for the rice harvest. George continued to teach God's Word in Sarawat and a number a people decided to follow God.

Around this time George's health started declining. Having suffered many bouts of malaria, he developed a liver disease and died in 2004. My daughter Wendy and her husband, Richard, continue to work among the Pwo Karen people, along with their co-workers, Stephan and Sandra.

BEHIND THE SCENES



↑ fter completing the NTM Atraining in the USA, I headed to central Brazil in 1977 where I taught at the mission school in Vianopolis for 22 years. What wonderful years they were! When I left in 1999, a big part of my heart remained in Vianopolis.

In January 2000, I went to North Cotes for six months to see if I could be of any help. Somehow, those six months stretched to nearly ten years.

At every stage of my journey, God has been faithful to provide. Returning to my hometown of Grantham. I moved into housing provided by an almshouse charity. I pay a very small monthly fee for a lovely home with a beautiful shared garden. In fact, I am now living just round the corner from the street where I was born! Almost all my family still live in Grantham. After so many years away, it is a joy to be back.

I thought my time serving with NTM was over, but in May 2021 I had a totally unexpected phone call from Frank Brearley (Chairman of NTM-UK) that opened up a new area of service. He invited me to join the board of trustees. I needed time to think and pray - I had no idea what it meant to be a trustee! I found the official definition is "the persons having the general control and management of the administration of a charity." It sounded like a huge responsibility but also a huge privilege.

Therefore, in October 2021, I was back at North Cotes for my first trustees meeting. It is great to feel I have an active part in NTM again, to be part of the trustees' team, and to spend time at North Cotes College. How exciting to hear of what God is doing amongst the unreached people groups around the world and to be a part of the support team.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT



In politics, the 'Overton Window' describes the range of policies and ideas that a population may find acceptable. Beliefs and opinions that lie outside of the window are commonly regarded as unthinkably radical or extreme. As culture moves this window of acceptability, the challenge for the shrewd is to predict what policies will be acceptable to the majority.

So, do we need to change? Yes and no. Our message cannot be altered so that it fits the popular mood. We can't leave out parts or add other ideas as we are not servants to popularity, but to the King of Kings. His nature and offer of salvation are unchanging. At home and abroad, we are to remain faithful and true communicators, 'never ashamed of the Gospel of Christ', for the Gospel alone is the 'power of God to salvation for everyone who believes' (Rom. 1:16). God's message does not depend on people to be acceptable; rather, people depend on the Gospel to be accepted by God.

However, our approach to people often needs to change. How we introduce ourselves in any context at home or abroad matters. Paul observed the 'Overton Window' of his day and tried to be 'all things to all people that by all means I might save some' (1 Cor. 9:22). We trust God to guide us to find new ways to live among and engage our communities wherever we are.

Likewise, we learn new ways to overcome changing restrictions that govern access to the most unreached peoples in the world. As Jesus sends His disciples out 'as sheep among wolves', He tells them to be as shrewd as a serpent (Matt. 10:16). Rarely is a serpent held up as a paragon of virtue, but cunning is required for believers everywhere in changing cultures when facing potential persecution or restriction in our mission and evangelism (cf. Matt. 10).

Everywhere, each of us wants to dispel suspicion and build relationships so that we can share the unchanged Gospel. May we be harmless as doves and depend on the Spirit's power (2 Cor. 4:5-7) to be shrewd in using all windows of opportunity to relate the best news of God's acceptance and reconciliation.
